Show & Tell



The case has 14 pencil depth drawers of a width to hold three "dozen packs" side-by-side. That would have been just one use for such a neat little chest of drawers. If I have the story right, A.J. made the first as a gift for a family member. It was

well received or, it must have been, because in the following months, he made 28 of them.

The boxes are mostly pine. No nails/screws. The drawer pulls are repurposed hobby shop "candle holders." The finish is a 50-50 poly & thinner mix plus just a few drops of mahogany oil stain to give it just a bit of a tint.



Mark Padesky – Mark wore out the 43" handle on his "oldie but goodie" cant. Having a shorter bed on his lathe, he put the word out to find a longer one. Bill Frerking came to his aid and let him turn the piece on his lathe. Mark says he can go anywhere when he carries his "big handled cant."

Russ Marie – A friend asked Russ if he could make "rustic" cabinets for the kitchen in his "rustic" cabin. As he pondered "rustic," he recalled that he had some cedar boards sawn out of a few large salvaged "pole butts" (the big end of a pole) some time ago. Most of it he used as fence boards around his yard but, not all of it. Here is what he did with the rest.







The first view is of the base. Note the inside corner where a lazy Susan might be used. But, that wouldn't be "rustic." So, to "do rustic," in the corner, he fashioned a sliding set of drawers. In the middle picture the drawer unit is in it's "stored" position, i.e., pushed to the right. The drawer unit is on rollers and it, even loaded, pulls to the left easily for access to the drawers. The drawers are fully suspended and the unit can't tip. It can only roll to the left.
