April Presentation: Gene Lair brought in the Rattan hamper he is working on to show some of the necessary and from my point of view difficult steps to successfully assemble and weave a Rattan Piece.

Earlier this year, Roland Behrens introduced us to the 7-Step Method Of Hand Weaving Rattan material into a chair seat. That inspired Gene Lair to venture further into "wicker" which is the general process of weaving. "Caining"refers to the materials being used. A skill building "wicker" project Gene suggested might be similar to the rattan clothes hamper he shared with us.

"Wicker" can be looked at as an offshoot of "woodworking." The internet is an amazing resource for information on materials and the skill building that will lead to mastering the craft. The tool requirement seem minimal. It doesn't require a great deal of work space or considerations like sawdust abatement but it will take patience and tenacity. If "wicker" doesn't inspire you, you might not like knitting either. If we all enjoyed the same things, it would be a uninteresting world, would it not.

Most of the Rattan that Gene uses is imported from China. The weaving is done keeping the Rattan strips wet and flexible. Gene's work always comes out great and the patience required to accomplish that puts him right up their with Job!!


A.J.Gatzemeyer: A. J. brought in five framed fused glass patterns that he developed using BullsEye useable glass.

A.J. will give a presentation on how he made the unique patterns at the June meeting.




