**Les Linton:** The box on the left is the product of a CNC skill builder exercise. It is a "candle box." He did the kumiko like work on his CNC but notice also, the joinery.

The shadow box protects key artifacts from his earlier days on the railroad. No digital locks or cell phone time pieces in those days.



**Bill Wiese:** Bill used his MicroJig MatchFit Accessories to make fixtures for these boxes or trays for incidental storage applications. He also presented a MicroFit assisted Kreg Pocket Hole fixture that wasn't in the pictures.



**John Freimuth:** John made this fine white oak box with walnut insets as a gift for his wife.





Lee Gatzemeyer: Lee fashioned an unusual cell phone stand from a machinist's scribe. Looks as if it might work well in a stationary application. It has it's appeal. The box has an epoxy inlay. He mixed colored caulk dust in the epoxy to get the translucent hue.







Vic McDonald: Vic made this small trinket box to look like a pair of glasses. Worked in there is some walnut, mahogany, aromatic cedar, zebra and a pair of golf tees.





**John Goodenough:** John just finished the second of a pair of purple heart and maple zig-zag boxes. He enjoyed making them and he will enjoy donating them to a favorite charity.





**Fritz Schoenbein:** Fritz made this rustic memory box from some ash and walnut that he had around for a good while. Notice the joinery. Sturdy little piece.





**Larry Coggins:** Larry turned this fine little round ring box. Neat piece.





Larry Truckenmiller: Larry made this well done walnut keepsake box. Good finish complete with a full compliment of finger joinery.





**Brian Berchtold:** The box on the left is maple with matched the grain all around. He used his





CNC on the oval box. Oddly enough, he said that these little boxes are easy to give away. Wonder if there is a waiting list.

**Russ Marie:** Russ rustled up some resawn cherry, warmed up his scroll saw and turned out these delicately decorated letter holders. The pictures fail to show how precisely the pattern is sawn. You still got it, Russ.





Mark Pedesky: Mark used white oak to encase authentic mid and large sized post office boxes. He sized the end grain with a 50-50 glue wash and applied a honey maple finish.





All in all, it was quite an interesting Show & Tell.
